## **PETERSON'S HOUSE**

School Report by Elaine Taves? (between 1978 and 1984)

Mrs. Winnifred Peterson was born in 1901. She married Harrison Peterson on April 7, 1922\*. As a wedding present Mr. Peterson built her a house. The house was built for his bride during the winter of 1921. It took then entire winter to build and it was finished in April. The property was bought from the Whittles. He bought a total of ten acres. Originally there was a log cabin there which was built by the first settlers but it was torn down. The man who built the Peterson's house was a mason from California who worked for a company that built fireplaces. This is why the stone arrangement differs from the other houses in the area. The coblestone [sic] on the house was picked up off of the land and land of his parents which was adjacent to it. On the sides of the porch and on the flat stools, stones were picked up off of the beach to be used as the middle layer inbetween the cement for a more decorative look. The house was built with a six inch space between the wooden frame and the stone. This kept the house very warm inside. Mr. Peterson copied the house except instead of having a glassed in area as did the hone he copied he made it into a breakfast room in order to make the house square. This house was the third flatroof house in the area at the time. The floors are made of oak which was one quarter of an inch thick. The woodwork in the front room is all oak but the woodwork in the back part of the house is Georgia Pine. This house was built during the same time period as the Miner house. It took a lot of time and work to beautify it. Harrison Peterson worked on its beautification for many years after the house was built. They planted trees in the yard in the fal of 1922. They carried the trees from the nursery and planted them themselves. The trees were Manitoba Maples. In 1942 Harrison dug up two Canadian Maple trees in the ditch along Graham sideroad to celebrate the birth of their daughter. These two trees were planted in the front vard.

Mrs. Peterson's Uncle Leonard Wilkenson [sic] (who was a prominent lawyer and later became judge) lived in Toledo. When he first visited her house he named it the Gladstone House. In fact it is still referred to the Gladstone House even today.

The Peterson's were very self sufficient. They tapped maple trees and made their own maple sugar in a cabin in his parent's bush. They had beehives which gave them the honey and they always kept up a small garden for fresh vegetables. They farmed tobacco for a living. Mrs. Peterson was an active member in the Weavers Gild [sic] (and still is) so she wove her own material and she also made their own soap.

The Peterson's were Empire Loyalists\*\* from Pennsylvania. Harrison's father was Josiah who lived on Lot eight Concession two. Norman Peterson who was Harrison's uncle was the man responsible for having the Heinz

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company built in Leamington. He went to Pennsylvania and brought Heinz back to Leamington and drove him around and let him stay at his house. He convinced Heinz to buy the old warehouse and start the company here in Leamington.

Mr. and Mrs. Peterson have two children John and Mary. Mr. Peterson passed away in July of 1979 but Mrs. Peterson is still alive. She lives in the Learnington Towers.

The Petersons sold all of their land except for their house where they lived until Mr. Peterson died. When he passed away they sold the house to the Velhuis who had bought the rest of the land for greenhouses. Mr. and Mrs. Sorenson who are Mr. Veldhuis' daughter and son in law now live in the old Peterson House.

Dennis Peterson was born in the State of Pennsylvania. In young manhood he came to Mersea township, county of Essex, where he followed the shoemaking trade, his shop having been located on a corner which is now included in the best portion of the business locality of Learnington. He died in 1856, aged sixty-five years, leaving a widow, formerly a Miss Kenyon. They had these children: Grace is deceased; John W. [...]

John W. Peterson was born April 24, 1829, in Mersea township. As a young man he followed farming, but at a later period embarked in the butchering business, being one of the first to engage in the wholesale butchering business in this section. [...]

In 1857 Mr. Peterson married Jane McMullen, who was born Jan. 3, 1832 in Ireland, and was three years old when the she came to America with her parents, John and Margaret (Dudgeon) McMullen. To Mr and Mrs Peterson were born children as follows: George, of Kingsville; Josiah, a prosperous farmer on Lot 8, Concession 2, Gosfield South; [...]

		was the second son of the later John Peterson, a brother to ex-Mayor N. Peterson of Learnington and had a large number of relatives, being connected by marriage with many of the leading families of the county. He was for many years closely identified with the agricultural interests of Gosfield and Mersea, was several times president of the agricultural society and at his death he was one of the directors of the Mersea, Learnington and
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		South Gosfield agricultural society. He was a man of fine physique, and seemed to be possesed (sic) of the elements that demand a long life. He was universaly (sic) respected and admired for his manliness, his generosity and willingness to assist forwarding any worthy object, and there (sic) few men in Gosfield South who were more popular with the people. Deceased was married to Mary Jane Whittle, who with twelve children yet survive. Of this number six children are married, while 3 sons and 3 daughters remain at home. He was a member of a large family, consisting of six brothers and four sisters, of whom four brothers and two sisters are yet living. His family and nearly all his relatives are members of the Methodist church. He believed in the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man and lived a pure honest and honorable life. The funeral took place on Tuesday at 2 p.m. with iternment (sic) at Olinda Universalist cemetery.

20 Feb 1930	LP p.5	A function of more than ordinary interest was the complimentary banquet given Tuesday evening at Auto Stop Inn Café by President Cecil Stobbs and directors of the Mersea Learnington and South Gosfield Agricultural society to the retiring president, Dan Kennedy, first vice-president Lewis Pickle, second vice-president Chas. Baker now reeve of Mersea, and Harrison Peterson, all of whom retired this year from the board of directors after many years of faithful service.
