Essex County continues to be a proactive community where growth and development is a priority while sustaining local traditions. The Essex County OPP is committed to public safety through collaboration, investigative excellence and visibility.

This plan outlines our strategic priorities and necessary activities required to ensure that our service delivery supports the OPP's vision of Safe Communities... A Secure Ontario.

Similar to previous years, this plan will have both provincial and local priorities and three areas of focus; crime, roadways, waterways and trails, as well as other operational commitments. The local priorities have been identified through consultation with our community stakeholders, our Police Services Board and our operational analyst as: traffic safety, mental health, youth and senior outreach, and community engagement. By focusing on these common themes, we will be able to have an even greater impact on community safety and well-being in Essex County.

We remain committed to reduce violent crime, property crime, and illicit drug use and distribution; and to enhance police response through engagement and education to community members experiencing a mental health crisis. With a focus on education and enforcement, our intention is to change high-risk driving behaviours that are known to be the leading causes of injuries and deaths. These behaviours include aggressive driving, impaired driving, distracted driving, and the non-use of seatbelts.

It is an exciting time of growth, development and positive change. With the ongoing support from our communities and the dedication of our members, we will be able to proactively meet the emerging challenges of the future and better serve our community.

Our Detachment

Essex County is situated at the most southern tip of Canada and is surrounded by vast bodies of water on three of its four borders. It is embraced by the Great Lakes Basin and hosts Canada's busiest commercial use of highway and port of entry from the USA. Essex County is rich in history playing a vital role in the War of 1812 with a town named after the most famous First Nations Warrior ever to live - Chief Tecumseh. Essex County is home to the Caldwell First Nation people and a Canadian National Park, Point Pelee, named after its distinct geographical point as the most southern tip of mainland Canada.

Essex County continues to experience significant commercial and industrial contributions. The sustainability of the automotive industry has a tremendous impact on Essex County's population, business vitality and culture. New industries and investment in Essex County such as the Stellantis battery plant in Windsor/Essex County are underway. Essex County is expanding in major infrastructure being home to the development of the new Gordie Howe Bridge.

Due to its warm climate, Essex County continues to grow in many wineries and towns popular for their tourist attractions and fine cuisine. The southern part of Essex County is the powerhouse of the food industry not only in Canada but in North America. Produce is provided all year round in new and modernized greenhouses using technologies that grow all the produce through advanced hydroponic methods to feed the world. These greenhouse operations and a continually expanding wine industry provides employment opportunities and economic stimulus for County residents. Locally, the temporary Foreign Worker Program continues to increase in support of some of North Americas largest greenhouse operations.

The community has a rural landscape of 1,851 square kilometres, including 160 kilometres of shoreline along Lake Erie, the Detroit River, and Lake St. Clair.

The county has all the advantages of the big city with residents able to attend any major sporting event or international concerts by traveling to the City of Detroit only minutes away through the International Tunnel or soon to be two international suspension bridges: the Ambassador Bridge or the Gordie Howe Bridge set to open in 2026.

Roadways, Waterways and Trails

REPORT ONLINE

You now have the option to report select occurrences to police from the convenience of a computer.

Visit www.opp.ca/reporting to use the Citizen Self Reporting system. Specific incidents can be reported online at your convenience without attending a detachment or waiting for an officer.

You can use this system to report:

- **Driving Complaints**
- Lost/missing property
- Mischief/damage to property
- Mischief/damage to vehicle
- Stolen licence plate(s) and/or validation sticker
- Theft From vehicle
- Theft

Do not use this system if this is an emergency! If it is, call 9-1-1.

9-1-1 is for police, fire, or medical emergencies only.

Every time an accidental or hang-up 9-1-1 call is received, OPP officers are dispatched.

You may be taking police officers away from a real emergency.

#KnowWhenToCall

If you've dialed in error, stay on the line and speak with the communicator. This will eliminate the need for the emergency operator to call back. As per OPP policy, officers will still be dispatched to ensure you are safe.
